



Guidance for Visitors

Safeguarding

All Leicester MusicFest personnel wear an official Festival lanyard or T-shirt, and enhanced-DBS-checked adults will be present at each session. All teachers, parents, guardians and carers are asked to report to anyone wearing a Festival lanyard any concerns relating to verbal or physical abuse of any child or young person. All reported incidents will be taken seriously by the Festival team, and will be documented and handled as swiftly as possible in accordance with best practice advice published by the British and International Federation of Festivals. A copy of our Safeguarding Policy is available for inspection upon request at the Front Desk.

Supervision of Minors

For the duration of the Festival all teachers/parents/guardians/carers are responsible for the continuous care and supervision of their own children/pupils. If they are unable to attend personally, they must delegate their responsibilities to an identified adult and ensure that their children/pupils are aware of the identity and name of the person responsible for their care. This includes supervision throughout all Festival sessions, and at lunchtime and during any breaks.

Photography

No unauthorised photography, audio or video recording of children and young people is allowed at Leicester MusicFest. Where parents/guardians/carers do not wish photographs to be taken at all, then the responsible adult attending should ensure that their child is not included in photographs taken by the Official Photographer.

Adjudicators

In the competitions, the Adjudicator's decision is final. Please do not attempt to discuss any decision with an Adjudicator during or after any competition class, unless invited to do so by the Adjudicator. Any complaint about the conduct of an Adjudicator should be made in writing to the Chairman, John Gull, at 1 Eastwood Road, Leicester LE2 8DD or via email to info@leicestermusicfest.com within seven days of the Festival.

Mobile Phones







St Andrew's Church Map




Map of English Martyrs' School


Main Festival building

Meet the Professionals

Leicester MusicFest is delighted to welcome this year's adjudicators and workshop leaders, who are all outstanding professional performing artists and teachers.

Joseph McHardy (Organ)

Joseph McHardy was born in Scotland to Congolese and English parents. At the University of Edinburgh, he fell in love with the harpsichords in the university's Russell Collection, one of the most extensive collections of historic keyboard instruments in Europe. He then studied harpsichord at the Royal Academy of Music, London, and spent a decade as a harpsichordist and conductor, working at opera houses from Berlin to Madrid, and performing and recording with ensembles including the Berlin Philharmonic, Le Concert d'Astrée and The Gabrieli Consort and Players.

From 2017 to 2023, he was Director of Music of HM Chapel Royal, St James's Palace, leading the choir which counts Tallis, Byrd and Purcell amongst its former members. During his tenure, he prepared the choir for many historic events, including the State Funeral of Elizabeth II, and the Coronation of King Charles and Queen Camilla. Since 2023, he has returned to Christ Church, Chelsea, where he is responsible for the 1779 England and Russell organ, rebuilt by Flentrop in 2010.



He has conducted the BBC Singers in two broadcasts, giving the premiere of Ben Ponniah's *Maida Vale Service* in 2021, and he appears regularly on BBC Radio 3 as a reviewer and presenter, including for a documentary about US civil rights leader Bayard Rustin's use of Early Music in activism.

Passionate about Black History, he has recently completed a recording project directing Chineke! Voices in the music of Vicente Lusitano, the first composer racialised as Black to bring their music to print in Europe, and his transcription, with Arne Spohr, of Lusitano's complete Latin motets is due for publication later this year by A-R Editions. He has contributed to the revision of Lusitano's entry in *Grove Music Online*, and has written for *The Guardian*, as well as giving interviews to BBC Radio 3, RTÉ Lyric FM, the Australian Broadcasting Corporation Radio, and the Trilloquy podcast.

Since 2023, he has combined his freelance career with that of Director of Music at St Paul's Girls' School in London, a post he holds in succession to Adine O'Neill, Gustav Holst, Ralph Vaughan Williams and Nicola LeFanu.

Jonty Nowell (Piano)

Jonty Nowell trained at the City of Leeds College of Music in Jazz and Contemporary Music, studied for his Master's in Composition at Nottingham University, and now works in and around Lincoln. He is active as a composer and performer in a variety of genres, from classical to jazz and folk music. Jonty combines his role as Director of Music at Burton Hathow Preparatory School with a busy freelance schedule. As a published composer and songwriter he has had premieres in Lincoln and Canterbury cathedrals and the Royal Albert Hall, among other places. He is also in demand locally as an accompanist and piano teacher.



Simon Lane (Piano)

Simon Lane has gained recognition for his compelling and sensitive performances and regularly collaborates with some of the world's most exciting musicians.

Alongside frequent performances in London's Wigmore Hall, Simon has appeared in venues such as the Berlin Philharmonie and the Queen Elizabeth Hall, and more widely across Europe and North America. Festival engagements include the Bachfest Leipzig, La Festival de Musique de Menton, the Dubrovnik and Ljubljana Summer Festivals, and the Leeds Lieder, Ryedale and Lichfield Festivals in the UK.

Since 2016 Simon has been Head of Keyboard at Whitgift School in Croydon, and he has recently been appointed Associate Professor of Accompaniment at the Norwegian Academy of Music (NMH) in Oslo, Norway.



Among other early influences on his career, Simon is indebted to the late Mark Ray, to whom he owes a large share of his love of music.

Libby Burgess (Piano)

Pianist Libby Burgess is well-known on concert stages across Britain, playing regularly in the country's major halls and festivals and on Radio 3. As both song specialist and chamber musician, Libby thrives on an unusually wide repertoire, and takes inspiration from the breadth of musicians with whom she works. Equally respected for her programming and curatorial skills, she is the founding Artistic Director of New Paths Music, where she has quickly been recognised for the striking creative tone of her programming. From 2018 to 2022 she was additionally Co-Artistic Director with Martin Roscoe of the Beverley Chamber Music Festival.



Libby's recent and forthcoming calendar includes a Radio 3 broadcast recital with Ailish Tynan from Oxford Lieder; concerts at Wigmore Hall with Alessandro Fisher, Leeds Lieder with Claire Barnett-Jones and Aldeburgh Festival with Ben Hulett; performances of *The Rite of Spring* with Chris Hopkins; a series performing the complete Beethoven cello sonatas with five different cellists; and broadcasts with the BBC Singers. Working often with living composers, Libby has most recently premiered Stephen McNeill's *Three Pieces for Piano* and, with regular collaborator baritone Marcus Farnsworth, *Everything Grows Extravagantly* by Cheryl Frances-Hoad – selected by *The Times* as a highlight of the year.

Libby is sought after as a vocal coach; she sat on the panel for Oxford Lieder's Young Artist Platform 2022, and mentored for the 2023 SongEasel Young Artist Programme. The seeds of her love for working with voices were sown as organ scholar at Christ Church, Oxford, where she read music, followed by postgraduate piano studies at the Royal Academy of Music. Libby was formerly Head of Keyboard at Eton College, is in demand as speaker and writer, and loves working in outreach contexts that seek to overcome barriers and share the power of music with everyone.

Currently undertaking a nationwide Bach marathon, 'Project 48', Libby is performing the whole of Bach's *Well-Tempered Clavier* ('The 48') in every one of England's 48 counties, in venues ranging from cathedrals and concert halls to houses, schools, barns and gardens. To date the project has raised over £30,000 for Help Musicians, Live Music Now, Future Talent and Youth Music.

Aaron Alexander (Singing)

Aaron is a passionate vocal coach offering personalised, one-on-one lessons either in-person in London or online via Zoom.

His clients have appeared in West End, Touring, and International productions, including *The Lion King*, *Wicked*, *Top Hat*, *King Lear*, *Clueless*, *Back to the Future*, *Trompe L'Oeil*, *9 to 5*, *Gypsy*, *The Witches*, *Becoming Nancy*, *Cabaret*, *Newsies*, *The Wizard of Oz*, *A Chorus Line*, *&Juliet*, *Heathers*, *The Book of Mormon*, *Hamilton*, *Phantom of the Opera*, *Hairspray*, *Jesus Christ Superstar*, *Mamma Mia!*, *Come Alive!*, *Chicago*, *Priscilla*, *Grease*, *Beetlejuice*, *Fame*, *Tina*, *Mary Poppins*, *Frankie Goes to Bollywood*, *Starlight Express*, *Matilda*, *Burlesque*, *Why Am I So Single?*, *Hercules*, *My Fair Lady**, *The Children's Enquiry**, *Frozen**, *Billy Elliot**, *Les Misérables**, and *Annie** (* = child performer credit).



His students have also been accepted into top performing arts schools and universities across the UK, including RADA, The Guildhall, Arts Educational, Mountview, GSA, Emil Dale, The Urdang, Bird College, Italia Conti, and East 15.

Aaron holds two Master's degrees: one in Voice Pedagogy from the Voice Study Centre and another in Music Education from Trinity Laban Conservatoire of Music & Dance. His areas of study include Trans inclusive voice training, the effects of hormones on optimal vocal production (both adolescent and mature voices), breathing techniques for dancers, and performance coaching for high-level athletes.

He has taught at several prestigious drama schools across the UK while building a thriving private practice, working with actors from theatre, television, and film.

Committed to staying at the forefront of voice teaching, Aaron actively engages in ongoing professional development. He regularly participates in masterclasses, seminars, and workshops with leading experts in the field, ensuring that his students benefit from the latest advancements in voice pedagogy.

Helen Smee (Singing & *Carmina Burana* conductor)

Helen is a conductor, workshop leader and organist working regularly with choirs and music organisations of all shapes and sizes. Born in London, Helen holds degrees from the University of Cambridge and the Royal Academy of Music, where she studied Choral Conducting with Patrick Russill. Following a stint as Director of Frideswide Voices, the girls' choir of Christ Church Cathedral, Oxford, and Acting Director of Music at Hertford College Oxford, she is now Director of Music at Southwark Cathedral in London.



Helen also works regularly as an assistant conductor with the National Youth Choirs of Great Britain, and is a co-founder, and now Artistic Director, of Voices of London, a week-long festival of choral music held each June. Passionate about widening access to music and the performing arts for young people, she is in demand as a workshop leader and choral advisor with a wide range of arts organisations. In 2018 she won the Members' Award from Action for Children's Arts in recognition of her outreach work with young people, and in 2021 was elected an Associate of the Royal Academy of Music.

Tim Morgan (Singing)

A member of the tenth edition of Les Arts Florissants' *Jardin des Voix*, Tim is a Samling artist and was a finalist at the Kathleen Ferrier Awards in 2019. In 2023 he was honoured to sing at the coronation of HRH King Charles III with The Monteverdi Choir under Sir John Eliot Gardiner.

Highlights of Tim's upcoming performances include a recital of Britten's *Canticles* and Purcell arrangements with Julius Drake and Ian Bostridge at the Festival de Música y Danza in Granada; performances of Francesco Conti's *La Colpa Originale* directed by Dorothee Oberlinger at Festival Alte Musik Knechtsteden and the Güldener Herbst festival; a concert of Purcell and Vivaldi with The English Concert; Bach's *Christmas Oratorio* with The Hanover Band; and *Partenope* (cover Arsace) with English National Opera.

Tim's recent opera and stage highlights include Britten's *Death in Venice* (voice of Apollo) in his debut with Welsh National Opera; Handel's *Partenope* (Armindo) with Les Arts Florissants; the title roles in Handel's *Amadigi di Gaula*, *Giulio Cesare*, and *Agrippina* (Ottone) with English



Touring Opera; Samuel Adams's play *Gabriel* with The English Concert and Alison Balsom; Britten's *A Midsummer Night's Dream* (Oberon) with Nevill Holt Opera; and *Blaze of Glory* (cover Bryn Bevan) for WNO.

On the concert stage, Tim has appeared as a soloist in a film of madrigals by Monteverdi, and in a programme of Schütz and Schein with The Monteverdi Choir and Sir John Eliot Gardiner. He was soloist in Händel's *Messiah* with The English Chamber Orchestra and Nicholas Kraemer, and with Ensemble Polyharmonique at the Händel-Festspiele Halle. Further appearances include Pergolesi's *Stabat Mater* with Orchestra of the Age of Enlightenment; Bach's *Christmas Oratorio* with Stephen Layton (Polyphony); Handel's *Dixit Dominus* with La Nuova Musica; Purcell's *King Arthur* with Vox Luminis; and duet recitals with Michael Chance MBE.

Alongside his work in classical music, his other projects include the singing on the soundtrack of the film *Saltburn* directed by Emerald Fennell; collaborating with multimedia artist Young-Jun Tak in his work *Wohin?*; and recording for PJ Harvey's 2023 album *I Inside the Old Year Dying*.

Alex Jones (Singing)

Alex holds a Masters Degree in Vocal Studies from the Guildhall School of Music and Drama where he studied with Marilyn Rees, and was awarded a Distinction and a Concert Recital Diploma for outstanding performance in his final recital. He enjoys a varied career working across the UK and internationally with ensembles such as The Dunedin Consort, Britten Sinfonia and The English Concert amongst others. He recently travelled to Spain with the Armonico Consort to sing Aeneas in Purcell's opera *Dido and Aeneas* as part of the Peniscola Festival of Early and Baroque music.

Additionally his solo work has taken him throughout the country performing works from Bach to Verdi and everything in between. Last summer he performed in Elgar's *The Kingdom* at the prestigious Three Choirs Festival, in Opera Holland Park's production of *Tosca* as Sciarone and in Longhope Opera's production of *Don Pasquale* in the title role. He has recently finished a run with the Royal Shakespeare Company in Stratford as part of their production of *Othello*. This season he will be reprising the role of Dr Dulcamara in Wild Arts's performances of Donizetti's *L'elisir D'amore* across the country, culminating in a performance at Opera Holland Park in August, and will be involved in this year's Proms with the BBC chorus of Wales.



Rhiannon Robinson (Singing)

Rhiannon Robinson is a mezzo-soprano, vocal coach and choral director based in Staffordshire.

During her studies at the Royal Northern College of Music and residence in Manchester, Rhiannon participated in various choral, musical theatre, and operatic endeavours which saw her tour internationally and perform in opera houses across the UK. As a workshop leader and vocal coach, Rhiannon has collaborated with many incredible companies including: Opera North and Grange Park Opera, with whom she introduced whole class singing sessions to numerous underprivileged schools across Greater Manchester.

She is now the Choral Director for Schools at Derby Cathedral, leading their *Music in Schools* and *Small Sounds* programmes which work with approximately nine hundred young people across the diocese.



Hayley Jenkins (Composition)

Hayley Jenkins is a composer who resides in Darlington, County Durham. Her compositions are predominantly written for chamber ensembles or soloists and explore the concepts of brevity and lyricism. Hayley has had the opportunity to collaborate with large organisations such as Streetwise Opera, working alongside community participants and artists and working closely with performers and ensembles, including the Delta Saxophone Quartet, pianist Duncan Honeybourne, and Plus Minus Ensemble.

Her music has been featured at the London Song Festival and Barnes Festival and played on BBC Radio 3, Kara Radio (Belgium), and Dizzy Atmosphere FM (Australia). Her most recent releases include her music on the Delta Saxophone Quartet's album *Late Music* (2023), released on Future Music Records, and Duncan Honeybourne's *Contemporary Piano Soundbites* (2020) on Prima Facie.



In addition to her career as a composer, Hayley works as a Senior Lecturer in Music at the University of Sunderland and as Lecturer in Music at York St John University. Simultaneously, she is pursuing her PhD in Composition under the guidance of Dr Gareth Williams at the Reid School of Music, University of Edinburgh. Beyond academia, Hayley is also the Musical Director for the Darlington Clarinet Ensemble and Darlington Concert Band.

Andrew Ashwin (Just For Fun classes)

Andrew studied Music at the University of Birmingham, then post-graduate singing at the Royal College of Music, graduating with Distinction. He continued his opera studies at the International Opera Studio in Belgium and the Zurich Opera Studio, before spending one year singing many baritone roles at the Deutsche Oper in Berlin. Highlights of his international freelance operatic career include the title role in the Austrian premiere of Britten's *Owen Wingrave* in Vienna, Mercutio in Opera Ireland's *Roméo et Juliette*, Maximillian in Vlaamse Opera's *Candide*, the title role in Lismore Music Festival's *Don Giovanni*, Junius in Frankfurt Opera's *The Rape of Lucretia*, and Danilo in *La Veuve Joyeuse*, Montpellier.

Andrew has sung numerous concerts and recitals across the UK, Europe, and further afield, including Mexico City, Bangkok, Singapore and Kuala Lumpur. He appears as a soloist on a number of opera and choral recordings, and he has sung much of the choral repertoire; highlights include Brahms' *Ein Deutsches Requiem* in Basel Cathedral, Handel's *Jephtha* in Oslo and Krakow and Mozart's *Requiem* at the Barbican, London. He is also in demand as a singer-pianist for functions and concerts.

For many years, Andrew was Musical Director of the Royal Academy of Music Chamber Choir (Junior Department). As a singing teacher and vocal coach, he is in high demand. He is a Fellow of the Royal Schools of Music (FRSM), and currently co-leads the singing activities across Leicester Grammar School Trust. He is also an ABRSM examiner, which has taken him around the country and to the Far East.

Andrew is a long-distance triathlete and ultra runner, and in 2022, his children's novel, *Drumendus: Mission to the Drum Planet*, was published.



Kirsty Body (Express Yourself workshops)

Harmonia Music was founded in September 1999 and is run by Kirsty Body B.Ed (Cantab). After several years as a primary teacher, Kirsty set up this exciting venture bringing a wide variety of music-making opportunities to people in Cambridgeshire and beyond. Over the years Harmonia has developed into a well-respected music business with many different strands.

Kirsty is a highly sought woodwind teacher, specialising in the first five grades for all woodwind, and up to Grade 8+ in her first instrument, bassoon. She runs singing groups including the fabulous Harmonia Singers women's choir, and has had great

success with the Harmonia Youth Singers and Young Singers, with many appearances at the National Festival of Music for Youth.

Kirsty has worked in many schools teaching woodwind, whole class instrument sessions (ocarina, samba, African drumming, keyboard, recorder, tin whistle) as well as general music curriculum, and is a former leading teacher for music for Cambridgeshire.



Current activities include Harmonia Singers, woodwind teaching, PhilHarmonia Orchestra (aimed at players up to Grade 5), wind band, African drumming workshops, and corporate team-building events.

Harmonia has become well known in more recent years for intensive ABRSM Grade 5 Music Theory courses, attracting pupils from all over the UK and as far away as Canada, Istanbul and Bermuda! Kirsty has developed her own course booklet which has proved very successful. In her spare time Kirsty loves crochet and gardening, and is gradually covering all the footpaths of Cambridgeshire on her long walks.

Aric Prentice (STELLOS Organ Workshop)

Aric Prentice - Director of Music and Master of the Choristers - has been associated with music at Lincoln Cathedral since 2001. For the first ten years of his tenure as Director of Music, he was proud to direct the girl choristers and was responsible for the Lincoln girls achieving parity with the boy choristers in workload, opportunities, and benefits.

A former chorister of Durham Cathedral and Choral Scholar at St John's College, Cambridge, Aric is a passionate advocate for the beauty of sacred choral music and the enormously enriching experience that it brings to everyone it touches.

Under his direction, the Choir of Lincoln Cathedral sings seven times each week, has broadcast frequently on radio and television, and has made numerous recordings. Aric also appeared as the conductor of Napoleon's coronation in Ridley Scott's 2023 Hollywood film *Napoleon*. He is the Principal Conductor of the Lincoln



Symphony Orchestra, with whom he has conducted more than forty works, including *The Planets*, *Scheherazade*, and many symphonies. He also regularly conducts the Lincolnshire Chamber Orchestra.

In 2025, he was delighted to be appointed a Fellow of the London College of Music in recognition of his many professional achievements.

Looking ahead, Aric is preparing for an exciting 2026 season with the Lincoln Symphony Orchestra, including performances of Dvořák's *Symphony No. 8 in G*, Rachmaninov's *Second Piano Concerto* and Saint-Saëns' mighty *Organ Symphony*, which will be performed in Lincoln Cathedral.

Jude Richardson (Festival Accompanist)

Born in Bermuda, Jude's early musical upbringing was in Afro-American spirituals and hymns, but as a boy he became captivated by classical music after being gifted music CDs by family friends. Fascinated by music and performing, Jude began to teach himself the piano, and by age 13 he was playing a wide variety of advanced repertoire. After hearing Jude play Chopin's challenging *Fantasie Impromptu*, ex-jazz trumpeter and piano technician Carl Shechtman sought support for Jude through arts non-profits and scholarship programmes, securing funding for him to begin taking formal piano lessons at the Bermuda School of Music.

Thanks to the generosity of the Bermuda arts community, Jude was fortunate to go on to study music in Denver USA with professional pianist and professor Alice Rybak, who prepared him for university music auditions. He won the David & Barbara Jacobs Scholarship at the prestigious Jacobs School of Music, which further supported his studies with international competition-winning pianist Evelyne Brancart. Jude performed widely in Bermuda and the USA, including at Bermuda's Premier's Concerts (2014 & 2017), for Indiana University's Summer Piano Academy (2014-2018), and in countless other recitals, events and fundraisers.



Arriving in Leicester in 2022, Jude has performed as soloist with the University of Leicester Symphony Orchestra under the baton of Dr. Paul Jenkins, acted as accompanist to the University Chorus, and worked with student vocalists. He performed Grieg's *Piano Concerto in A minor* in June 2023 with the Rugby Rococo Players, and last year performed Beethoven's *Emperor Concerto* with the Leicester Symphony Orchestra under Dexter Drown at De Montfort Hall. In addition to performing, Jude writes his own music and teaches piano at the University of Leicester and in schools around the county.

Jonathan Jarvis (Festival Accompanist)

Jonathan is a versatile musician who enjoys a portfolio career in music. Alongside work in the theatre, Jonathan is an accomplished accompanist for festivals, exams, auditions, and competitions. He also enjoys performing with smaller ensembles, including his jazz trio and improvisation group, *Ad Lib*.

Jonathan trained at the Guildhall School of Music and Drama, where he graduated with a first-class Master's degree in Collaborative Piano and went on to become a Junior Fellow. Currently, he works as an ad hoc staff pianist, co-directing The American Songbook Company module and occasionally collaborating with students from the acting course. On graduating, Jonathan was selected as a Britten-Pears Young Artist.



Jonathan began his musical journey at the University of Huddersfield, where he earned his undergraduate music degree with first-class honors and was awarded the Rodwell Prize for Piano. It was during his time there that he developed a love for accompaniment and collaborative playing. Whilst a student there, he founded his first function band and gained valuable experience as a répétiteur for dramatic societies.

Jonathan maintains a thriving private piano studio and serves as Musical Director and

Vocal Coach for singers at the Leicester College of Performing Arts. His work extends to Curve Theatre, where he has acted as Musical Director for two youth theatre groups, preparing them for various productions.

As a session musician and arranger, Jonathan has recorded piano tracks ranging from video game soundtracks to song accompaniments, including the album *Final Fantasy Crystal Chronicles*, with his recent SATB arrangements being featured in concert performances.

In 2025, Jonathan was delighted to be Musical Director for LAOS's production of Sondheim's *Into The Woods* at Curve, Leicester as well as Keyboard player and music staff at Thursford's *Christmas Spectacular*. Alongside performing, Jonathan is also a co-founder and trustee of Leicester MusicFest.

John Gull (Festival Accompanist)

John is a collaborative musician and music educator based in Leicester, with a broad portfolio encompassing one-to-one teaching, group coaching, and community music. He has a background in church and cathedral music, having been a chorister at King's College, Cambridge, Organ Scholar at Corpus Christi, Oxford, and a tenor lay clerk at

Lincoln Cathedral. He has thirty years' experience as a singing teacher, with students regularly going on to study singing at conservatoire, with choral scholarships at Oxbridge, or to professional training choirs such as Genesis Sixteen. Several of his former students are now flourishing professional singers, including two currently on contract with the Royal Opera House.

John is a committed community musician, and very proud to be Chairman of Leicester MusicFest. As a small part of the fantastic Leicester MusicFest team, he has organised large-scale community music projects, and is passionate about creating opportunities for school and university students, adult amateurs and professional musicians to work together as a single musical community.

He currently conducts Leicester Pro Arte Singers, is Co-Director of English Martyrs' Schola Cantorum, is Director of Music at St Andrew's, Jarrom Street in the city centre, and Musician-in-Residence at Charnwood College in Loughborough.

As a repetiteur, John enjoys working with a wide variety of soloists, including artists with Waterperry Opera and City Music Foundation. He has a strong background in liturgical organ playing, and continues to perform as an organist for visiting choirs at cathedrals around the UK. He is a regular adjudicator for competitions, and appears regularly as guest conductor for choirs and orchestras around the Midlands. He is looking forward to conducting the Rugby Rococo Players again for their summer concert in July 2026. He also enjoys composing, and some of his original work has been broadcast on BBC Radio 3.




David Cowen (Festival Accompanist)

St Andrew's Church's newly-rebuilt organ

The 3-manual pipe organ at St Andrew's, Jarrom Street, Leicester was originally built in 1920 by Stephen Taylor & Son, the highly-regarded local firm noted for their robust instruments and classically-influenced tonal schemes. The organ was conceived as a substantial and expressive instrument employing tubular-pneumatic key action and offering a comprehensive specification across Great, Swell, and Choir manuals, with an independent pedal division.

Taylor was at the height of his powers, having recently completed the critically-acclaimed symphonic instrument at De Montfort Hall, and his superstar voicer, W. C. Jones (celebrated creator of the famous 'Harrison sound' in the previous decade) also brought his expert touch to the voicing of the organ at Jarrom Street. The layout and scaling reflect Taylor's characteristic emphasis on clarity and blend, with colourful resources supported by couplers on each manual. Jones' virtuosic voicing favoured articulate speech, balanced chorus work and strong foundational tone, making the instrument ideally suited to repertoire of the nineteenth and early twentieth centuries.

Having given good service for over sixty years, the organ was overhauled in 1985 by Kenneth Canter (Bury St Edmunds) on what was likely a rather tight budget. Despite Canter's attention and with steadily advancing years, general wear to the key action, stop action and the wind system increasingly affected the instrument's reliability and response, and by Easter 2025 a temporary digital organ had to be brought in to cover for the increasingly unplayable pipes.

In summer 2025, the organ was comprehensively restored by Aistrup & Hind (Lincoln). They replaced the pneumatic stop action with more powerful electric motors and stabilised the wind supply, while carefully conserving original pipework and voicing. The work has restored the instrument's tonal integrity, returning all its original colour together with a new standard of precision and responsiveness for the player. A suite of new divisional and general pistons, a digital sequencer, and 150 levels of memory, give the organ much greater musical flexibility and ensure its continued suitability for solo and ensemble performance at the heart of an exciting music program at St Andrew's.

About the Leicester MusicFest Composition Competition


Musical composition is a very personal form of self-expression, and people come to it from many different routes. This year we have prioritised opening up our Composition Competition to promote more varied formats and writing processes, and to give more listeners the opportunity to engage with the winning pieces. Composers can now write for any instrument or ensemble, and can use varied notation formats: lead sheets and DAW recordings are welcome, as well as staff notation.

This much wider variety of formats makes it less feasible to perform the winning pieces live, so we have instead introduced a Listening Station at the Festival, as well as promoting the winning pieces on our website and social media channels. Please do go and explore these wonderful new pieces of music during your visit or online.

We have also introduced a new mentoring component to the prize: First Place winners receive a one-to-one Zoom mentoring session with our composition adjudicator; an opportunity to receive further personalised feedback and professional tips for taking their composition further.

We are very grateful to the Rotary Club of Blaby for helping us to set up our Composition Competition in 2021, and for sponsoring our two impressive Composition trophies.

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About *Carmina Burana*

The title and texts of *Carmina Burana* were taken from a thirteenth century manuscript discovered in the monastery of Benediktbeuern in Bavaria by Johann Schmeller, who published it in 1847. Mixing ancient German and crude 'dog' Latin, it is very far from what you would expect monks to be writing, except perhaps on their toilet walls! These profane texts, as well as the gutsy, elemental music provided by Carl Orff, made the cantata a source of controversy from day one. *Carmina Burana* is musical Marmite - people either love it or hate it!

The texts are often crude, rude, and lewd, but they have a primitive, graphic power, offering a window into distant times - warts and all. The Latin poetry is bold and rhythmic, brought to life by Orff's pulsating score and dramatic word setting. The first and final movement, *O Fortuna*, has embedded itself in the popular consciousness through countless quotations in film and entertainment - and many will recognise it as the theme tune to ITV's *X Factor* talent show.

Orff's music is simple and robust, with muscular melodies, often delivered by vocal parts in unison. What makes his sound so exciting is the percussion section: Orff used a huge battery of percussion and applied it lavishly, giving a hard-edged sound appealing to our most primitive instincts.

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The cantata is made up of three sections or tableaux, prefaced by an 'overture' which is repeated in full at the end of the work. The three sections explore different aspects of human experience in their texts:

Fortuna Imperatrix Mundi (Fortune, Ruler of the World) portrays Man as the helpless slave of Lady Luck, who whimsically dispenses success and failure. As the Wheel of Fortune revolves, so the fortunes of helpless mortals wax and wane. The machinations of Fortune are a recurring theme throughout the work.

1. Primo Vere (In the Springtime) celebrates Spring, the rebirth of Life, and the re-awakening of Love. The first three numbers venerate the seasonal renewal of nature, leading to the fourth, *Uf dem Anger* (On the Green), which explores more specifically human passions.

2. In Taberna (In the Tavern) concerns the sinful dregs of humanity who shun the light of day, the embittered losers at Fortune's wheel who waste their lives drinking, eating, gambling, and... so on! This section concludes with the somewhat eccentric tale of a roasted swan, comically squawked by the countertenor soloist.

3. Cour d'Amours (Courtly Love) returns to the great outdoors, where Spring has sprung and all of Nature, both animal and vegetable, blossoms. Dies, Nox et Omnia is a tour de force for the baritone soloist, who has to span three vocal registers, while the soprano's virtuosity is displayed in the brief but evocative *Dulcissime*.

The return of *Fortuna, Imperatrix Mundi* as the 'postlude' is arresting, not only for its musical impact but also for the abrupt and shocking return of pessimism, just when the courtly love narrative had reached its climax.



Biographies

Helen Smee (Director)

Helen is a conductor, workshop leader and organist working regularly with choirs and music organisations of all shapes and sizes. Born in London, Helen holds degrees from the University of Cambridge and the Royal Academy of Music, where she studied Choral Conducting with Patrick Russill. Following a stint as Director of Frideswide Voices, the girls' choir of Christ Church Cathedral, Oxford, and Acting Director of Music at Hertford College Oxford, she is now Director of Music at Southwark Cathedral in London.



Helen also works regularly as an assistant conductor with the National Youth Choirs of Great Britain, and is a co-founder, and now Artistic Director, of Voices of London, a week-long festival of choral music held each June. Passionate about widening access to music and the performing arts for young people, she is in demand as a workshop leader and choral advisor with a wide range range of arts organisations. In 2018 she won the Members' Award from Action for Children's Arts in recognition of her outreach work with young people, and in 2021 was elected an Associate of the Royal Academy of Music.

Harriet Burns (Soprano)

Harriet Burns is in demand for her singing both in recital and on stage. An acclaimed interpreter of song, Harriet has performed at Wigmore Hall, Philharmonie Luxembourg and de Singel with Graham Johnson, Oxford International Song Festival with Imogen Cooper and Sholto Kynoch, Leeds Song with Joseph Middleton and Ryedale Festival with Christopher Glynn. Harriet regularly works with Ian Tindale, with whom she released *Schubert Lieder: Love's Lasting Power* and *A Short Story of Falling*, both with Delphian Records, to critical acclaim.

On the operatic stage, recent roles include Susanna (cover for the title role, Händel) for Opera North, Berta (cover, *Il barbiere di Siviglia*, Rossini) for West Green House Opera,



King Harald's Saga (Judith Weir) for Waterperry Opera, *Sifare* (cover, *Mitridate, re di Ponto*, Mozart) and *Oriana* (cover, *Amadigi*, Händel) for Garsington Opera. In concert, she has sung Thea Musgrave's Songs for a *Winter's Evening* with the Southbank Sinfonia and Gabriella Teychenné, Händel and Mozart arias with Michael Bawtree at the National Concert Hall in Dublin, Bach's *Magnificat* and Vivaldi's *Dixit Dominus* with Nicholas McGegan and the Royal Northern Sinfonia at Sage Gateshead and Händel's *Messiah* with the Academy of St Martin in the Fields.

In 2023, Harriet was elected an Associate of the Royal Academy of Music. She is proud to be a singing teacher for Frideswide Voices, and a vocal coach at the Guildhall School of Music and Drama.

Tim Morgan (Countertenor)

A member of the tenth edition of Les Arts Florissants' *Jardin des Voix*, Tim is a Samling artist and was a finalist at the Kathleen Ferrier Awards in 2019. In 2023 he was honoured to sing at the coronation of HRH King Charles III with The Monteverdi Choir under Sir John Eliot Gardiner.

Highlights of Tim's upcoming performances include a recital of Britten's *Canticles* and Purcell arrangements with Julius Drake and Ian Bostridge at the Festival de Música y Danza in Granada; performances of Francesco Conti's *La Colpa Originale* directed by Dorothee Oberlinger at Festival Alte Musik Knechtsteden and the Güldener Herbst festival; a concert of Purcell and Vivaldi with The English Concert; Bach's *Christmas Oratorio* with The Hanover Band; and *Partenope* (cover Arsace) with English National Opera.

Tim's recent opera and stage highlights include Britten's *Death in Venice* (voice of Apollo) in his debut with Welsh National Opera; Handel's *Partenope* (Armindo) with Les Arts Florissants; the title roles in Handel's *Amadigi di Gaula*, *Giulio Cesare*, and *Agrippina* (Ottone) with English Touring Opera; Samuel Adams's play *Gabriel* with The English Concert and Alison Balsom; Britten's *A Midsummer Night's Dream* (Oberon) with Nevill Holt Opera; and *Blaze of Glory* (cover Bryn Bevan) for WNO.

On the concert stage, Tim has appeared as a soloist in a film of madrigals by Monteverdi, and in a programme of Schütz and Schein with The Monteverdi Choir and Sir John Eliot Gardiner. He was soloist in Händel's *Messiah* with The English Chamber Orchestra and Nicholas Kraemer, and with Ensemble Polyharmonique at the Händel-Festspiele Halle. Further appearances include Pergolesi's *Stabat Mater* with Orchestra of the Age of Enlightenment; Bach's *Christmas Oratorio* with Stephen Layton (Polyphony); Handel's *Dixit Dominus* with La Nuova Musica; Purcell's *King Arthur* with Vox Luminis; and duet recitals with Michael Chance MBE.



Alongside his work in classical music, his other projects include the singing on the soundtrack of the film *Saltburn* directed by Emerald Fennell; collaborating with multimedia artist Young-Jun Tak in his work *Wohin?*; and recording for PJ Harvey's 2023 album *I Inside the Old Year Dying*.

Alex Jones (Baritone)

Alex holds a Masters Degree in Vocal Studies from the Guildhall School of Music and Drama where he studied with Marilyn Rees, and was awarded a Distinction and a Concert Recital Diploma for outstanding performance in his final recital. He enjoys a varied career working across the UK and internationally with ensembles such as The Dunedin Consort, Britten Sinfonia and The English Concert amongst others. He recently travelled to Spain with the Armonico Consort to sing Aeneas in Purcell's opera *Dido and Aeneas* as part of the Peniscola Festival of Early and Baroque music.

Additionally his solo work has taken him throughout the country performing works from Bach to Verdi and everything in between. Last summer he performed in Elgar's *The Kingdom* at the prestigious Three Choirs Festival, in Opera Holland Park's production of *Tosca* as Sciarrone and in Longhope Opera's production of *Don Pasquale* in the title role. He has recently finished a run with the Royal Shakespeare Company in Stratford as part of their production of *Othello*. This season he will be reprising the role of Dr Dulcamara in Wild Arts's performances of Donizetti's *L'elisir D'amore* across the country, culminating in a performance at Opera Holland Park in August, and will be involved in this year's Proms with the BBC Chorus of Wales.



Ian Tindale (Piano)

"A wonderfully responsive and assured pianist" (*The Telegraph*), Ian Tindale is increasingly in demand as a specialist in song repertoire and chamber music, with partners on the song stage including Roderick Williams, Helen Charlston and Benjamin Appl. Highlights in 2025 include a return to the Aldeburgh Festival for a recital of Britten, Holst and Kidane with Nick Pritchard, and a recital at the Oxford International Song Festival with Soraya Mafi. Other frequent collaborators include James Gilchrist, Julien Van Mellaerts, Robin Tritschler, Ailish Tynan and Bethany Horak-Hallett.

Ian has performed at the Edinburgh International Festival and the Royal Opera House, Covent Garden, and on BBC Radio 3 and the BBC World Service with BBC New Generation Artists tenor Santiago Sánchez and clarinettist Annelien Van Wauwe. Hailed as 'an articulate and sensitive partner' (*Opera Today*), other recital highlights in past seasons include at Salle Bourgie (Montréal), Palau de la Música (Barcelona),

and Het Concertgebouw (Amsterdam), and he has been invited to curate song recitals for the Ludlow English Song Weekend and the Samling Institute, both at the Wigmore Hall (London). His album of Schubert Lieder, *Love's Lasting Power* on Delphian Records with regular duo partner and soprano Harriet Burns was praised as 'a very fine disc indeed' (*Gramophone*) and received five stars from the *BBC Music Magazine*. Their second disc, *A Short Story of Falling*, will be released in summer 2025 and features two world premieres by Christopher Churcher and Derri Joseph Lewis.

In recent years, Ian has held roles as Official Pianist to the Wigmore Song Competition in London, the International Vocal Competition in 's-Hertogenbosch, and the Queen Elisabeth Competition in Brussels. Ian is also the founding Artistic Director of Shipston Song, an annual festival in the Cotswolds, UK, and he is a vocal repertoire and song coach at the Royal College of Music, London. Ian lives in Oxford with his partner, organist Richard Moore.



Richard Moore (Piano)

'A smouldering musician, with incredible rhythmic precision', Richard Moore has performed to audiences across the globe, from North America to Australia and New Zealand, as well as throughout Europe. Concerto appearances have included Lou Harrison's *Concerto for Organ with Percussion Orchestra* (collaborating with conductor Thomas Søndergård), and amongst recent recording projects is a first recording of Elizabeth Poston's *Te Deum (Praise him with trumpets)* (Hilary Campbell and Bristol Choral Society, Delphian 2025) and the premiere of Philip Moore's devotional sequence, *Via crucis* (Convivium, 2023).



Richard is Sub-Organist at Christ Church, Oxford, where he articulates the liturgies of the Cathedral and is Deputy Conductor of the world-renowned Cathedral Choir. Before moving to Christ Church he was Sub Organist at Guildford Cathedral where in addition to acting as Deputy Conductor for the Cathedral Choirs he accompanied the choral foundation in liturgies, recordings, and broadcasts, under the direction of Katherine Dienes-Williams.

A prize-winning graduate of the Royal College of Music, where he studied organ with David Graham and improvisation with Sophie-Véronique Cauchefer-Choplin, Richard also read

Music as Organ Scholar of St John's College Oxford, studying with ethnomusicologist Martin Stokes. Whilst at the RCM he was involved in the Historical Performance department, including the 24 Violons du Roi project, which culminated in an appearance at the 2012 BBC Proms. During this time, Richard was also the William and Irene Miller Organ Scholar at St Paul's Cathedral (2011-2013), where, in addition to playing for services and training choristers, he also played at a number of important occasions, including the funeral of Baroness Thatcher. After leaving St Paul's, he spent a year as Acting Assistant Organist of St Martin-in-the-Fields, where he was custodian of the important Walker organ, and accompanied the three principal choirs in a varied liturgical and concert programme, and on BBC Radio 3 and 4. A highlight of his time at St Martin's was the service to commemorate the 70th anniversary of VJ Day, which took place in the presence of Her Late Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, and was broadcast on BBC television.

Beyond his duties at Christ Church, Richard is one half of the Trumpet and Organ duo "Illumina", whose *Illuminations, Dances, and Poems* recording (Convivium, 2017), received 4 stars in *Organists Review*. A 'technically very confident' musician who finds 'fine colours' on the organ, Richard studied at the Royal Danish Academy of Music with Bine Katrine Bryndorf and holds the Soloist Diploma of the Royal Danish Academy of Music. Committed to the belief that music is a constant dialogue between scholarship and performance, Richard is active as a researcher and writer. His interests include British organ culture in the second half of the twentieth century, and currently he is working on the organ music of Ethel Smyth. He is a trustee of the Arabesque Trust, a charity which supports visually-impaired organists, and sits on the steering committee of the British Organ Archive.

Jack Goodwin (Percussion)

It has been a joy to work with the Leicester MusicFest team these past few years; I have accompanied the choir projects and played in the "house band" for the improvisation workshops. I look forward to being involved in the 10th Anniversary Festival in February 2026.

I have been playing the drum kit for 21 years. As a student I studied and performed with ensembles in Leicestershire Arts in Education (Leicestershire School's Music Service) before going on to study a BA (Hons) in Creative Musicianship at university. Four years ago, I became a self-employed peripatetic teacher, and have been teaching one-to-one drum kit lessons in schools around Leicestershire ever since. I also perform with various bands & songwriters playing a mixture of original music and covers of famous songs.



As well as working with Leicester MusicFest, I am also involved with a community-run record label based in Market Harborough called Somewhere Records; where I volunteer my time to help with weekly meetings and creative output of the record label.
